Member Spotlight

In this issue of NYSAFLT News, **Kathryn Inhelder** shares her NYSAFLT story!

I grew up in North Tonawanda, New York. From a very young age, I remember reading Madeline and wanting to visit the Eiffel Tower. In school, I always loved French class. My middle school and high school French teachers were full of energy and adventure. We sang songs, created skits, wrote poems, read books, and ate delicious food! I also had the opportunity to travel to Quebec City during the winter carnival season with the high school French club. It was amazing!



Being able to eat and dance at the cabane à sucre, walk the narrow streets of Vieux Québec, tour Sainte-Anne-de Beaupré, learn about Québec's history through wood carvings at Atelier Paré, and the ability to ice skate on the frozen lazy river at Valcartier, left a lasting impression on me.

After graduation, when I applied for college, I had no idea what I wanted to do for a career. I did know that I loved French and wanted to continue learning the language. SUNY Plattsburgh offered the perfect location: 28 miles south of the Quebec border. My French

professors were wonderful. With the help and encouragement of **Dr. Margaret Leone**, I completed a one-year study abroad program at the Université de Montpellier III: Paul Valéry. Living with two different host families allowed me to experience the culture and daily life on a personal level. They were extremely supportive, helpful, and caring. They helped me improve my language skills while sharing their home and their family. I fell in love with France! I also had the opportunity to participate in a short study abroad experience in Martinique. Being able to read Aimé César's work and then being able to meet him in person was something that I will never forget. Through these experiences, I realized that I wanted to share my love of travelling and the Francophone language and culture with others.

I graduated with a B.S. in Elementary Education with a concentration in French from SUNY Plattsburgh and then took courses to obtain my French 7–12 NYS teaching certification as well as Birth–Grade 2. I began my teaching career in February 2006 teaching French at Beekmantown Middle School, in West Chazy, NY. My colleagues were supportive from my very first day on the job. They were willing to share resources, materials, and introduced me to NYSAFLT. They would talk about how much fun they had at NYSAFLT annual conferences and the colleagues that they were able to connect with year after year. I definitely wanted to be a part of that.

The first NYSAFLT conference that I attended was in Saratoga Springs and my colleagues were right. I met teachers from all over the state and was inspired by the knowledge and talent that was shared at the workshops. As a new teacher, I was in awe and grateful for the willingness of not only the presenters but the attendees to share their materials, games, and project ideas with me. I still have **Deb Carlson**'s flashcard games and activity packet close by in my desk drawer. I have not only attended annual conferences, but summer institutes as well. Each one is just as inspiring as the first.

While teaching, I would commute 2–3 evenings per week to McGill University, in Montreal to complete my M.A. Second Language Education degree. Despite the close proximity to Plattsburgh, NY, the educational system and policies for language learning are very different. My classes were filled with teachers from around the world. It was great to discuss the value of language learning and to hear different perspectives on the matter.

In 2010, I became a Capital-East regional director for NYSAFLT. This position allowed me to connect with teachers in my area like **David Graham**. Now, in 2021, I am embarking on another term as a co-director for the Capital-East Region. I still teach middle school French, but since 2012, I have been teaching at AuSable Valley-Middle High School, in Clintonville, NY (even the school's name is French!)

I have led and chaperoned student trips to France, Quebec City, and Montreal. Nothing makes me happier than to see students put what they have learned in the classroom to use and to experience something new for the first time. I love to hear them say "I understood that sign Madame! I know what the menu says!" It always warms my heart to see the students' awe and wonder as they cross the Pont Champlain into Montreal for the first time or when they see the twinkling lights of the Eiffel Tower.

Finally, when I am not working, I am Mom to Sylvie (age 5) and Mirabelle (age 3), wife, daughter, aunt, sister, and friend. We enjoy spending time outdoors (sailing on Lake Champlain, skiing, snowshoeing, or walking the fairy trails through our woods). We enjoy dancing, drawing, baking, and trying new recipes. We have been host parents to students from China and Spain as well. Our girls call them their "big brothers and sister." If I have a quiet moment alone, I enjoy reading while drinking a hot cup of tea. We all look forward to traveling again, when it is safe.




Mid-Hudson Westchester

In memoriam: Judy Martialay

Judy Martialay (1938 - 2021) passed away on March 29 at the age of 83.

Judy was born in Mount Vernon, NY and received her B.A. from Mount Holyoke and her M.A from Columbia University. During her career, Judy taught language at the elementary, middle and high school levels. She was also very involved in NYSAFLT's public advocacy committee, and spent many years lobbying for world language education in Albany and Washington D.C.

Judy travelled extensively to countries such as Algeria, Egypt, Ethiopia, Israel, China, Mexico, Spain, Italy, and Greece. She was also the author of two children's books: ¡Hola! Let's Learn Spanish and Bonjour! Let's Learn French and was working on an Italian version at the time of her death.

Anthony received a B.A. in Secondary Education/Spanish/Italian from Hofstra University, an M.A. in Foreign Language
